The Wild Side

This year I decided to embrace the concept of 'rewilding' in our garden, much to the consternation of Mrs. P, who leans to the 'municipal garden' look (I think it is the German in her, in fact we still have arguments about The Sudetenland, I tell her even though the people there speak German, they are Czechs, but she's having none of it!).

The only work I have been doing in the garden this year is cutting grass. This chore has been getting easier over the summer as the hedges are getting bigger and encroaching on the lawn, making less and less for me to cut.

Our borders are full of nettles, Sow thistles and Ragwort, the last two being technically Asters, so I think I can loosely call this a flower garden.

The most striking thing I have noticed is the more diverse wildlife we have in the garden, flocks of Goldfinch (King Harrys) are in residence, along with Bullfinch, Greenfinch and Chaffinch. I have also noticed more Wrens and Collared Doves, along with our resident Sparrowhawks. I now see Green and Greater Spotted woodpeckers nearly everyday, and our Little Owls have had another successful year.

Maybe the downside is the number of Wood Pigeons (Dows) nesting in the garden, one of which smashed a window while being chased by a female Sparrowhawk. Overall I have been pleased with the outcome, but next year I'm sure I will be back to the weeding and topiary by order of the Frau!

I love Stroganoff but making it can be quite a faff and expensive. Try this instead.

Poor man's Stroganoff

Ingredients

500g minced beef; 1 onion, diced; 2 cloves of garlic, minced 250g mushroom, sliced; 1 can of condensed mushroom soup 300ml sour cream; salt and pepper

Method

Fry beef in a little oil until browned, add onions garlic and mushrooms and continue to fry until onions are transparent. Add the mushroom soup and a splash of milk, cover and cook for 5 minutes.

Add salt and pepper to taste, then add the sour cream.

Heat mixture gently but don't boil.

Serve with hot buttered tagliatelle.

Saturday 13th September 1924

THE SPOILT HARVEST

In early August prospects were looking hopeful, but recent weeks of cold wet weather has dashed hopes of a good harvest.

BACK TO THE FIRESIDE

On Sunday 21st September the clocks change and we will be back to long dark evenings. The Bill to extend summertime to 6 months as in France and Belgium was defeated in the House of Commons.

TENNIS

Due to the hoplessley uncertain weather, very few tournaments have been played and no matches whatever.. Much money has been spent on re-laying parts of courts and weeding of the remainder. There was also a record number of new members. The final tournament to be played last Wednesday was cancelled due to the weather.

LADY CRANWORTH, The Divisional Commissioner of the Girl Guides will visit next Wednesday to present The Shield won by the 1st Framlingham Company for work done during the winter. The ceremony will take place in the Rectory Garden at 5.45pm.

WINTER ENTERTAINMENT IN FRAMLINGHAM

Nearly every evening there is a meeting of a little band of folk somewhere in the town regarding some sort of 'show'. FADS has abandoned the idea of a musical and now members are busy reading plays to select one to be staged just before Christmas with a big cast to utilise the talents of as many members as possible.

In this issue there was a very long article on dog shows and notes about a possible sugar beet factory in Suffolk, the new Agricultural Wages Act and a proposed East Suffolk Bacon Factory.

Framlingham Weekly News Sat 27th Sept 1924 HARVEST FESTIVAL

Held in St Michael's Church on Wednesday evening with a very full congregation. The church was decorated with corn, flowers, fruit and plants.



The services to continue on Sunday when the sermon in the evening will be preached by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese and collections will be in aid of the Hospital.

MARRIAGE OF DR VINTER of the Hannings and MISS PHYLLIS HOLME-PILKINGTON, daughter of Mrs Pilkington of Pembroke Road and the late Rev J. Holme-Pilkington, Rector of this parish for 33 years.

The ceremony was performed by the Rev Daniel Holme-Pilkington [brother of the bride]. The entrance gates were decorated with miniature union jacks

FWN Sat 27th Sept 1924 continued

THREE MONTHS FOR WATCH THEFT

At the Courthouse on Saturday.

Frederick Fosker, watch and clock repairer of Great Blakenham was found guilty of stealing a silver watch [30s] belonging to Arthur Kettle of Ashfield. P.C Ginn stated he was a nuisance and real pest to the district. He seemed however to be a good husband and father to his 4 children. He had 2 previous similar convictions and The Bench sentenced him to 3 months hard labour.

Prisoners undergoing Hard Labour were kept in silence with hard, boring work like the treadmill or picking oakum. This pointless exercise was finally abolished with the Criminal Justice Act of 1948.

Framlingham Weekly News \$th October 1924 ST MICHAEL'S DAY

Last Monday the Patronal Day of St Michael's Church was duly observed by Holy Communion at 7.45.

Festal Evensong was held at 7.30pm followed by the Parish Social in the Assembly Hall. The Rev N.Fowler presided and the evening included songs and recitations, concluding with Mrs Jarley's Waxworks.

OUR CASTLE

Progress of the Work of Preservation.

The task of renovation was begun in 1913 and is now nearing completion. As we all know, a comparatively small heap of antiquity is all that remains of what was once a very beautiful castle.

But even so, the ruins have always been an object of great admiration to all classes of visitors.

Two more of the 13 towers remain to be done for the work to be completed by HM Office of Works - Ancient Monuments Dept. in approximately 2 years time. The Dept Architect is Mr Arthur Heasman and the foreman of the work is Mr Knapp.

An enormous amount of material is being removed from the moat, which is now much deeper than it previously appeared. The old well is being used for obtaining water for the current works.

HARVEST FESTIVALAT FRAMLINGHAM

The Bishop gave a very helpful sermon which was printed in full and therefore took up a lot of space in this issue. The collections for the hospital totalled £17.

CORRESPONDENCE

Sir - Report says the Rev T.J.Brereton is about to leave Framlingham - a very serious loss as there is not 1 clergyman in a 1,000 gifted with such power of voice to fill so large a church as ours, so that everyone may hear as distinctly as they do him.....

The Saturday October 11th issue of the FWN is missing from the archive.

Framlingham Weekly News Saturday October 18th 1924 THE BREAKNECK ELECTION

This is the hastiest election on record with Parliament dissolving last Thursday week, nominations due in by today and voting 11 days later on October 29th.

The Framlingham Weekly News is very partisan in its reporting - it goes on:-



Labour has demonstrated its utter incompetence to govern and advising its readers to all vote Conservative if it is to be saved from going guite to the dogs.

In the 1923 election, Lord Huntingfield [Cons] 11,172 votes/ Liberal Samuel Lyle 9,244 votes and Labour's Mr Kendall 2,984.

1923/1924 elections permanently changed the political landscape in the country.

In 1923 the election result was inconclusive; the Conservatives lost but nobody won. Baldwin was seeking a mandate to introduce tariff protection to tackle growing unemployment.

At the time the Liberal party supported free trade as did Labour. Lloyd George had acquired substantial funds through the sale of honours whilst he was Prime Minister. The cashstrapped Liberal Party was grateful for his election donation of £90,000. Consequently the they ended up holding a quarter of the seats in Parliament and the balance of power.

Labour finished as the 2nd largest party but Ramsay MacDonald formed the first ever Labour government with the support of the Liberal's. By 1924 the Conservatives had resolved their internal differences and the Liberals removed their temporary support for Labour and Stanley Baldwin returned as Prime Minister for the Conservatives.

Framlingham Weekly News Sat October 18th 1924 cont FRAMLINGHAM GIRLS NETBALL TEAM

A match was played last Friday against the Parham Boy's team, the boys winning 11 goals to 3 after playing a strong and very smart game.

There was a very long article on the development of bicycles by 'Penny Farthing'.

CONCERT FOR CHURCH HEATING

Held in the Assembly Hall and organised by Mrs Woodgate and Miss A. Clarke. There was a varied programme of songs, comic songs at the piano and an amusing sketch.

Framlingham Weekly News Sat Oct 25th 1924 FLOODS

Residents in low-lying parts of the Parish spent a few anxious and uncomfortable hours this week due to the heavy rain and consequent floods. Water was running through houses causing inhabitants to retreat upstairs. Wosrt of all was near Mr Woodgate's cowshed on Fairfield Road. The milk cart had to be towed through the flood by a horse and tumbril. This made the milk rather late that morning.

EYE ELECTION

A very long column on 2 of the candidates speaking in Framlingham, Lord Huntingfield and Sir Thomas Bethell. Labour's Cpt Kendall will speak on the Market Hill on the eve of the poll.

FRAMLINGHAM POLICE COURT on Saturday

George Stannard, a farmer and dealer of Monk Soham was found guilty of moving calves to premises other than that on the movement licence. He was fined £1 and !s 4d costs. He was also fined 7s 6d for keeping a dog without a licence.

The dog licence was introduced during the 1800s and was made mandatory in 1959 before being finally abolished in1987. In Parliament the opposition tried to reintroduce the dog registration scheme in 1989, without success. Ed

GREENFINGER TIPS FOR SEPTEMBER & OCTOBER

SEPTEMBER

Sow hardy annuals for flowers early next summer.

Lift gladioli corms, dry off and store somewhere frost-free over winter.

Plant out spring bedding in pots & borders.

Collect ripe seed and store in labelled envelopes.

Lift, divide and replant congested perennials once they have finished flowering.

Plant spring bulbs in pots and borders.

Trim evergreen hedges.

Prune climbing and rambling roses once flowering is over - if repeat flowering leave until later in the year.

Keep camellias, rhododendrons and azaleas well watered to ensure good development of next year's buds.

Place pumpkins and squashes on a piece of wood or slate to prevent rotting on damp soil.

When beans have finished, cut off to ground level to leave the roots which will release nitrogen into the soil as they break down.

Tidy up strawberry plants and pot up runners to make extra plants for next year.

Start picking apples when they come away easily. Harvest plums - if too many you can freeze them Cut back fruited canes of summer raspberries, leaving the new green canes for next year's crop.

OCTOBER

Lift dahlia tubers, or cover with a thick mulch if you leave them in the ground.

Take hardwood cuttings from deciduous shrubs.

Harvest pumpkins and squashes.

Cut back yellowing asparagus foliage to within 5 cms of the ground.

Divide congested clumps of rhubarb

Prune hedges.

Reduce the height of shrub roses to avoid damage from windrock over winter.

Divide rhubarb clumps if needed.

Move deciduous shrubs that are in the wrong place or have outgrown their position.

Lift and pot up tender perennials, such as chocolate cosmos, gazanias and coleus to protect over winter.

TOMATO RELISH RECIPE [Class 34]

750g [1 1/2 lb] tomatoes 225g [8oz] onions

112g [4oz] sugar

138ml [1/4 pt malt vinegar

½ tsp salt.

Skin & chop tomatoes coarsely, place in saucepan.

Peel & chop onions, add to tomatoes with all remaining ingredients.

Heat to dissolve sugar, simmer until mixture becomes thick.

Pot in clean warm jars - with a non-brand lid or in a kilner jar.

Since doing that we have tidied other areas of the Town Centre.



BLAST FROM THE PAST


From the Lamberts Almanack of 1897.

The authorities have deemed it advisable to warn the public by putting up 'Dangerous' notices.

Another large lump weighing several tons fell from the top of Queen Mary's tower in the Castle Yard in October.

PERCY STANNARD RECOLLECTIONS

John Bridges thinks these notes were probably written in the late 1950's. The following are edited extracts pertaining to the Court House, [which features regularly in the 100 Years Ago in Framlingham series] - by kind permission of John Bridges.

The complete article was first published in the Journal of the Framlingham & District Local History & Preservation Society, Series 7 Number 1 in October 2015

What I first remember about Framlingham is we had a Superintendent of Police living at the Police Station in Bridge Street, [on site of library car park], and in November 1906 had my first encounter with the police. The late Mr F G Ling was at that time Clerk to the Magistrates. I had only been at the

office a few days when I was sent down to the Court House with his bag of books and papers ready for the Saturday morning Police Court Petty Sessions. My employer told me to go up the wooden stairs used by the magistrates and to put the bag on the landing near the Retiring Room door.

A fortnight later I was sent again to the Court House with the bag and was to leave it in the same place as before. But, no, our Superintendent of Police, a great burly policeman weighing at least 16 stone was blocking the entrance to the stairs, and said to me 'Young man, these stairs are not for the likes o' you, you will take your bag up the stone stairs.' I pleaded I was only following instructions be he was adamant and for all the time he lived there I had to use the stone stairs.

Somehow after this little bout I never took to him kindly as he seemed much too officious. I liked his daughter more than him. Her father drove a horse and cart in those days and occasionally had to be away from home all night. More than once I have helped to hump a piano up the stone stairs for a supper and musical evening in the Court House.

When he left we had a Police Inspector and a sergeant as well as two or three constables. Now we have to make do with a sergeant and constables.

[Now of course its all changed!]

About that time we had a County Court Office with a permanent clerk on duty and every other month the County Court Judge would come in his wig and gown and hear cases in the Court House.

Now The Clerk to the Justices is no more, the whole system of Clerkship being centralised and a most efficient lady solicitor now comes from Ipswich to attend the magistrate's court as Clerk.

THE STAIRS:

Middle right is the posh wooden stairs for the use of the magistrates. Now covered in lino. the 'Magistrates Only' sign was returned to the Court House last year, having been discovered in a garden shed where it had been stored for safekeeping to save it from the skip probably!

Lower right are the stone steps for the likes of Percy Stannard and also the route from the cell to the court room. The white edges are presumably more modern to suit our H & S mindset!





The next gate houses are at Broadwater and Brick Lane. At Hacheston there was not a Station, only a request stop down from the village.

Between Hacheston and Marlesford there was an unmanned crossing on a small by-road. Here the fireman would get off the engine to open the gates and the guard would close them.

While I'm writing about the railway line, I would like to mention that my wife Joan had an archaelogocal dig bordering the railway cutting on the west side of Framlingham. She unearthed the remains of an Iron Age site which was written up in the East Anglian Archaeology publication 'Settlements on Hill-Tops 1993.' There is a possibility the greater part was lost when the cutting was made? Bill Flemming





Research

GPTraining



NATURE NOTES

Continuing the theme of birds of prey from the last issue: there are at least two more success stories to report.

The red kite is becoming an increasingly common sight in the skies of Suffolk. Not so long ago, these birds were confined to a small patch of wild central Wales, having been treated as vermin in much of England.

Following an extensive re-introduction programme from Scandinavia and Iberia, these birds are spreading eastwards and are now resident in the county. They are lighter in build than buzzards and have a very distinctive forked tail together with a notch in the trailing edge of the wings between the primary and secondary flight feathers. Their russetty-red plumage is also particularly noticeable if they are wheeling around in flight.

The last regular locally-occurring raptor is the marsh harrier. These were reduced to very small numbers, principally found at Minsmere, but have increased significantly over the last few years.

Although they live mainly in coastal reed-beds, they will fly inland, often following river courses. Again, they are lighter in build than buzzards with a longer tail and have a habit of quartering ground with wings held in a shallow 'V'.

Moving on to things that have been happening locally, it's been another rather strange summer. Many migrant birds were late arriving due to cold weather in southern Europe. The hot spell in late June saw large numbers of damselflies (particularly the azure species), but they almost disappeared in the following cooler spell.

The moorhens on our pond managed to raise two chicks from their first brood (very unusual) and (at the time of writing) are busy feeding a second.

We received five elephant hawkmoth caterpillars which had eaten all of the willowherb in my brother-in-law's garden and were looking for a new food source. They are named for the similarity of the caterpillar to an elephant's trunk.

If disturbed they will draw their head back into the body, increasing its diameter and inflating the 'eye' spots on the middle segments.

The adult moth colours are a garish mix of lime green and



fuchsia pink; they may be on the wing from May until early August.



WILDLIFE IN THE GARDEN The Woodlouse



Woodlice are also known as slaters and pillbugs and are found in gardens with a healthy ecosystem. They are mainly beneficial and spend their time breaking down damp decomposing plant material, so may be found in your compost heap.

There are 30 species in Britain, 5 of which are commonly found in gardens. They participate in the food chain by being on the menu for shrews, toads, centipedes, some spiders and ground beetles. They are active at night and during the day hang out in dark. damp spots.

Eggs are produced in spring and kept within the female's body until they hatch. They then spend a few days acclimatising in a brood pouch on the underside of the female before heading out into the big wide world.

They are similar in appearance to the adults and will shed their outer shells a few times as they grow. By the late summer they are adults and will overwinter before reproducing themselves in their 2nd year. SB
